Home Maintenance: The Joy of Sharing the Load

If you are a homeowner, have you ever had one of these conversations with your spouse, a roommate, or a repair person? "Well, the washing machine broke down today." "The dishwasher and microwave both quit working this week and have to be replaced." How about: "The air conditioning system is beyond repair. You need a new one and you need new duct work." Or: "There's water in the basement. We're going to have to drain it, pull up the carpeting, and put in new flooring." Then there's the dreaded: "It's time to bite the bullet and put a new roof on the house."

Perhaps you've experienced the joy of moving into a home, only to have it followed by all that can be involved in maintaining that home as the conversations above so aptly illustrate. This can be the shared experience we have had in moving into the home we know as Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC). We've moved in and now want to maintain the home in a responsible manner rather than taking it for granted.

During my time as service coordinator, I have had numerous congregations who have been longtime members, as well as others who have recently joined LCMC, tell me that they "feel like they've come home." Other times, they tell me what a blessing it is to have a home for their congregation in which they feel at peace, and can feel proud of (in the best sense of that word).

We all know that moving into a house requires ongoing upkeep and maintenance, and this is also true for LCMC, which almost 1,000 congregations now call home. Just a few examples of our ongoing upkeep and maintenance include:

- Providing financial support for our association staff, Board of Trustees, and Ministry Board who all work to provide various services for member congregations and leaders;
- Creating and implementing a strategic plan for the association that enables us to live out our mission, vision, and values as an association;
- Providing support services, training, and resources for call committees, church councils and lay leadership, as well as conflict management, pastoral certification, and more:
- Providing guidance, encouragement, training and support for district and fellowship coordinators and leadership teams, who in turn are caring for congregations and connecting leaders with one another;
- Providing a contact for the hundreds of phone calls, emails, and texts we receive each week:
- Providing media resources that help keep us connected and encouraged, such as our website, e-newsletter, blog, and By the Word magazine;
- Planning and implementing events such as our Annual Gathering,

national leadership conferences, and LeaderCare retreats. Each of these events network people together for relationship, vision casting, and equipping for life and ministry;

- Providing oversight of all the details necessary to offer pension and insurance benefits to pastors and leaders:
- Providing all the administrative services necessary to create and sustain an organization of soon to be 1,000+ churches in 16 countries; and
- Coordinating work with teams in the areas of church planting, and youth, young adult, and children's ministries.

All of this and more are part of the upkeep and maintenance of our LCMC home. It is a load, but it is easier when it is a shared load across the association. There can be a joy in sharing the responsibility for maintaining our home with one another, rather than relying on only a select few to do so.

Last year fewer than 1/2 of our almost 1,000 congregations made a financial contribution toward home maintenance in LCMC, and we are so

- The board finalized the church plant funding/distribution guidelines, to be presented at the Annual Gathering.
- The board adjourned the meeting and closed in prayer.

Encouraging People to Become Pastors

With the shortage of pastors for congregations now plainly upon us in North America, what can current pastors look for in a person whom God may potentially call to pastoral ministry? In the past, current pastors were not necessarily encouraged to watch for people who might have the gifts and calling to become future pastors.

In fact, a common opinion was expressed that if one could do anything *but* be a pastor, he or she should pursue that alternative path. If one could not do anything but be a pastor, *only then* should pastoral ministry be pursued.

The structure of our LCMC association, combined with the current shortage of incoming pastors, means we need to adopt a more proactive approach to identifying and encouraging people to consider God's call to pastoral ministry. All calls to ministry ultimately come down to God and the person being called within the context of the community of the church. God can use current pastors in the process of calling future pastors.

In this article, I share how God called Rev. Wendy Poch to become a pastor and succeed me as pastor at Spirit of Hope Lutheran Church (SOH) in Parker, Colorado.

The pastoral succession at SOH really began several years prior to the formation of the plan, though we didn't realize it at the time. In the fall of 2015, Wendy and I were the SOH delegates to the LCMC Annual Gathering in Texas. Wendy was soon

to finish homeschooling her children and wondered what God had in mind for her next. During a break in the schedule, she shared with me the struggle she was having.

I asked her, "Have you ever thought about being a pastor?" Wendy's service and the qualities I had noticed in the years she had been a part of our congregation led me to that question.

Wendy had run our youth program, served on our governing board, sang in choir, as well as served in other areas of congregational ministry. After prayer, conversation with family and friends, further conversations with me and working through some theological issues, Wendy discerned that the Lord was calling her to pursue pastoral ministry. Her journey began and was supported all the way through by SOH.

So, what can current pastors look for to encourage those whom God may be calling to pastoral ministry?

- A relationship of love with the Lord that moves in the direction of obedience and spiritual health.
- 2. A love for God's people in the community of the church.
- 3. A godly character exemplified by commitment, selflessness and humility.
- 4. A curiosity and interest in theology.
- 5. Affirmation from brothers and sisters in the church ("You would make a good pastor!").

I saw all these qualities in Wendy. As pastors are made aware by God of people whom He may be calling into the office of pastor, sharing those insights with potential pastors can reveal to them what they may not realize or have ever considered.

What can current pastors do? We are not recruiters in the sense of secular employers.

Pastors are called by God, not hired by congregations.

The best approach for current pastors might be found in 1 Samuel 16. While in the home of Jesse when looking for the replacement for King Saul, the prophet Samuel was in constant prayer with God. The Lord kept guiding Samuel until he came to a young boy named David.

While keeping an eye out for the qualities that might make one a good pastor, we should always be praying and listening to God. "Lord, whom do you want to call?"

Hope Lutheran Church Big Lake, MN

Nestled down a county road, surrounded by a National Wildlife Refuge in the township of Orrock, sits a well-established Lutheran church that many might overlook. The new town hall is also on that dead end road, as well as a cemetery.

The little church has an interesting history, dating back to over 150 years. At one time, another mile up the road, sat one Lutheran Church and this one. One was a Norwegian Lutheran Church and the other a Swedish Lutheran Church. Though they were close in proximity, they were separated by culture.

That is until 1967, when a bolt of lightning hit the one church and burned it to the ground. Then in 1968, a tornado wiped out the other church. It was then Hope Lutheran Church was formulated to band these two churches together. Even through those hardships, the light of the Gospel could not be put out.


Many things have transpired since that time. Pastors came and pastors left. Children grew up and moved away. The older folks went on to their eternal rest. Numbers dwindled, but through it all the lights stayed on. The synod they belonged to tried to help, but location... lack of members... and lack of finances prevented them from helping this little church find their next pastor. The shortage of pastors didn't help. Still, the tenacity of this small group persevered.

COVID came and COVID left. This church got a little smaller, but their love for Jesus... their love for each other... and their love for their community kept fighting to stay alive. They kept the lights on!

Today, they worship about 25. They just got a new pastor, who just so happened to move into the area. It started out as a pulpit fill, which turned into a part-time call. They cut ties with their former synod. It wasn't easy, but it was the best thing for them to do.

A number of new people have come as of late. Hope Lutheran Church was welcomed with loving arms into fellowship with LCMC in March 2024. After all these years, God's doing a new thing at Hope. A feeling of new life is springing up.

If you ever find yourself in beautiful Orrock, Minnesota, come find us at Hope Lutheran Church, where the Light of the Gospel is still shining.

Church planters were introduced.
A pastor leading a church in a local YMCA. A pastor whose humble church plant has grown into an established, large congregation. Leaders nurturing house churches. Community center congregations. A pastor leading a rebuilding after a fire. International planting – a Lutheran church in Uruguay. A pastor starting a church in a sports bar. Baptizing. Confirming. Worshiping. Surrounded by beer signs. A Zoom screen. Boxes holding stories. All woven with a common thread – answering God's call to church plant.

What has grown out of this, and so many other similarities (and so, **SO** many differences!) has been a gift to our association and to one another! A group of pastors/leaders/congregations/seminarians – all leading church plants or coming from church planting roots from all over the world, gathering around God's Word. His promise to meet us where we are.

This, paired with the desire to build up church planting in the LCMC, has created a fellowship: LCMC's Church Planting Fellowship. A sounding board. Support. A fellowship of *networking*, *strategy*, *prayer*. A space to discern God's call to plant a church. A place to come to learn more. Ask questions. Hear testimonies. A catalog of resources. Churches, people, congregations and small groups with

the desire and passion to support the mission of church plants. There's a seat at this table for them too. This fellowship will offer support from the trenches. Battle wounds. Triumphs.

If you're reading this, chances are you are not immune to the statistics surrounding the church. Words such as declining. Shortage. Numbers. Youth. Families. Generations. The worries around buildings and clergy. The reality can be terrifying. Paralyzing. And...freeing. Full of hope. Promise. Because...the pendulum swings the other direction as well. A changing world can open doors for opportunities. Dare I say...*New Normals?*

Church plants have bridged the gap between communities of churched and unchurched people and built communities that preach solid Theology. Scripture alone. The Gospel. Freedom. Church plants have creatively navigated meeting people living on the fringes. Feeling lost. Even hurt by the church. Church plants have thrown away the rigidness that resides inside a building. The identity being found in a church building is replaced with the truth of the church. ("For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them." Matthew 18:20). Traditional church buildings, heavenreaching steeples, and breathtaking stained glass are being replaced by

sports bars and YMCAs. Unusual. Aesthetically contrasting. But still the same, unwavering, steadfast God. The Spirit at work. The One who calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. *Meeting us where we are.*

I recently taught a children's lesson (around tables at Shenanigans Sports Bar!) about Paul's letters to the Philippians – written from jail. *The Children's Bible* summed up this story with a simple, yet profound sentence. "Paul sent a letter to the Philippians from jail with some wonderful news. 'Can you believe it?' he wrote. 'God is working. Even here!'" Church planting in the LCMC. A verb. A noun. Even descriptive. Can you believe it? God is working. Even here!

Pastors Directory Changes

To better assist congregations, call committees, and others, the LCMC Ministry Board initiated changes to the pastoral list categories that will be reflected on the LCMC website in May 2024.

Current categories are not well defined and allowed pastors to be in more than one category. This unclarity was difficult to explain and created unrealistic expectations, especially among call committees. The updated categories will better reflect a pastor's current call status.

The new categories will be:

- Under LCMC Call: Those with a current letter of call to a LCMC congregation
- Not Under LCMC Call: Those not currently under call or serving a non-LCMC congregation

- Available for Call & Ordination:
 Those not under LCMC call and have not been ordained.
- Deployed as Chaplain Called by an LCMC congregation and serving as a chaplain in military, healthcare, and other organizations
- Deployed Called by an LCMC congregation and serving a separate specialized ministry
- Retired Certified pastors who retired from their congregation
- Emeritus Certified pastors who received Emeritus status from their congregation
- Inactive Those no longer seeking call or who have been without a call for more than 3 years

Categories being removed:

- Active
- Available for Call

THE POWER OF THE GOSPEL

"And Jesus said to them, 'follow me, and I will make you fishers of men."

— Mark 1:17

When I was 8 years old, my brother and I would try to catch 15-pound carp with tiny hooks and 8-pound test line. Needless to say, it did not work very well. We simply left the carp in our boat-dock-village with little brass hooks decorating their lips and a distaste for our best bait.

When Jesus promises to make disciples into "fishers of men," they did not picture that they would be casting out a lure and hoping someone might bite.

Little did my brother and I know we needed to get a better hook and stronger line. We focused on the bait. The carp were just sitting there near the surface of the water. Turns out bread, balled up on the hook, worked the best of all our attempts. We just had to get the fish to bite before the bait fell apart.

Is this how the Gospel works? Is the bait the fragile part and the method needs more support?

Is that how the Gospel works? No! Much less the common misconception that in order to 'catch' a person there is a set thing to be said, or emotion to be felt, or expression of 'true' faith that will assure us of a person's salvation. The power is not in the fishermen. It is not in us. And the Good News is not dependent on our notion of what faith must look like in those we love.

The Gospel is so much more powerful than that concept of fishing. And yet we find ourselves thinking – "If we can just teach our people to set the hook."

Our village is filled with wounded men and women who have bitten down on this empty idea of religion.

The image for these professional fishermen was not a lure, but that of a net. The Gospel is not bait we must

get someone to bite down on from their own free will and logical understanding.

The Gospel is a net. An all-powerful, all-encompassing reality that sweeps over us and captures us in the wonder of God's almighty presence. The Gospel is a direct proclamation of authority!

"And they were all amazed, so that they questioned among themselves, saying, 'What is this? A new teaching with authority!" — Mark 1:27

God is not waiting for us to trust Him. He creates TRUST by His WORD as promised, given through broken preachers and common elements.

How powerful is the Gospel? With how much attention and care must we treat this fulfilled and at-hand energy? How much do we need to be aware of what God is doing through us in order for God to use us to repent another person's faith?

It turns out the Gospel is much more powerful than we ever could imagine. It is more than a formula or a feeling. It is an assurance. The belief that God knows the words a person needs to hear to be set free from the empty promises currently tugging at their lips. God knows what creates trust in His promise.

And that power is not dependent on the preacher. Whether well-rehearsed or casual conversation, the Gospel is an all-encompassing **net** that sweeps over us and captures us in the presence of our Almighty God.
